40		Thesis/Hypothesis --Highly developed theme is followed throughout presentation and developed in words and images that clearly spell out the intended message.
5		Design --Design is interesting and shows creative imagination. Used an appropriate template/color scheme(s) for the background. Presentation is well-organized and visually appealing...with a selection of components conceptually tied to the theme.
5		Layout --The layout is pleasing to the eye, appropriate to the message, and uses space well. Fonts and point sizes are well chosen for easy readability.
15		Introduction --Title Slide has a sharp focus and is organized so to immediately grasp the viewer's attention.
20		Spelling/Grammar --All slides must be free of grammatical/spelling/composition errors.
20		Number of Slides --Minimum of 20 and maximum of 30 slides required.
10		Graphics --Minimum of 5 appropriate integrated images that relate to the theme are present Please use appropriate graphics/pictures from Internet, animated graphics, and word Art. You can use many more than 5 but 5 must be used.
120		Evidence of Research --Slide must have source of research/and very last slide containing all resources used
5		Bulleted lines of text should contain a maximum of 6-8 words per line.
5		Timings Set --Presentation is set to run automatically during presentation allowing adequate time to view each element. (Rehearse Timings)
5		Music Used --Appropriate (in Mrs. Chisholm's opinion) music file(s) included and it/they should be timed to end with the presentation, please remember to package your music with your presentation, before submitting
20		Closing --A slide contains a picture of the author and appropriate information to indicate the close of the presentation--closing is effective. Persuasive Conclusion for your Thesis!
5		Level of Difficulty --Presenter displays the ability to use PowerPoint features.
10		Presentation/Delivery --Effectively integrates spoken and visual presentation. A high degree of organization. Has an excellent knowledge of subject studied.
15		Submission --Upon completion of the presentation, the student will submit the following: 1. a CD which contains the Presentation, music, and PowerPoint viewer(Package for CD Option) 2. this form with the name of the student filled in. (This form will be used for evaluation.) Submit through blackboard.
